

1. QUALITATIVE AND QUANTITATIVE METHODOLOGIES

Aim	To compare quantitative and qualitative methods
Skills	Evaluation, analysis and knowledge and understanding
Time	40-60 minutes depending on group size
Preparation	None

Student activity

Students brainstorm differences between quantitative and qualitative methods as a whole group.

Each student then takes the role of a positivist who favours the exclusive use of quantitative methods. They spend 5/10 minutes writing a letter to the person on their right who they should imagine to be an interpretivist who uses qualitative methods only. The brief letter should be both a criticism of the qualitative approach and an explanation of the superiority of quantitative methodology.

Students then pass the letter on to the person on their right and now read the letter they receive as if they are an interpretivist. They write a reply defending qualitative approaches and making critical points about the positivist position.

The process can be repeated as many times as you wish, letters either being swapped or passed on around the class.

Teacher notes

Students find it easier to write critical evaluative comments when addressing each other. Though they may struggle initially to find more to say as each exchange of letters occurs, they are pushed to evaluate further. Students benefit from seeing the work of other students and may transfer ideas gleaned from the person on the left to the person on the right, thus assisting peer learning.
